**AMERICAN AIRLINES PLANNING BIGGEST EXPANSION
AT DFW AIRPORT SINCE SEPTEMBER 11**

***Airport Applauds AA Moves, Resumption of 2nd DFW-
London Gatwick round trip in March***

DFW International Airport (January 29, 2002) DFW Airport's strong operational rebound in the new year takes another major bounce this spring, with its hub carrier American Airlines adding more than 40 flights to its schedule, including expanded service to several international destinations. American is also increasing service between DFW and several destinations beyond pre-9/11 levels.

American will add a second flight between DFW and London Gatwick three times per week on March 14, making the second flight daily at the end of the month. American is also restoring and expanding international service between DFW and Mexico City and Monterrey. Three of American's DFW domestic routes will actually have frequency levels higher than pre-9/11 flights: Fort Lauderdale, Las Vegas and New Orleans.

With these additional flights, DFW will be down just 8.7 percent in departures March 2002 versus March 2001. Comparing DFW departures March 2002 versus August 2001, the month before the terrorist attacks, departures are expected to be down just 7.6 percent.

American Airlines tallies nearly 70 percent of the passenger traffic at DFW, and the Airport works closely with its largest tenant to provide its passengers the largest flight schedule and most convenient service available.

"DFW's commitment to American Airlines is a win-win opportunity for North Texas travelers and connecting passengers from around the world," says Joe Lopano, executive vice president of marketing at DFW. "We see this latest robust expansion of service as a testament to the strength of the DFW marketplace and further signs that the airline business is making a steady recovery. We applaud American's efforts and are hopeful that further flights will be reinstated in April."

The latest service additions from American also give DFW a strong boost in its post 9/11 recovery. With the latest flight additions, the Airport expects to be down just seven percent in year-over-year passengers from April through June, and at approximately the same levels in August through the remainder of 2002.
